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## FUTURE OUTLOOK

As we approach our first year of completion, we are looking to continue our work housing clients and reducing the caseloads of safe harbor case managers. We have a vision to also include a more robust pathway to behavioral health and substance use treatment. We want to continue to increase our access to services in order to continue to have positive outcomes.

We will continue to focus on entitlements, connections with community partners, and increasing access to care and housing for those residing at Safe harbor.

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# TA Topic Summary

For topics selected, the TAC team works with key stakeholders to understand the community's overarching goals, tailor the depth and focus of the training, and recommends the ideal method of training (e.g. didactic, hands-on workshops, strategic planning sessions, etc.)

## **Jail Diversion Strategies**

Content would explore proven approaches to safely redirect individuals with behavioral health needs away from incarceration and toward treatment, housing, and community supports. Training may cover:

- Models such as Crisis Intervention Teams (CIT), Law Enforcement-Assisted Diversion (LEAD), and mental health courts.
- Building cross-sector partnerships between law enforcement, behavioral health, courts, and community providers.
- Data collection and evaluation to track impact and outcomes.

## **Best Practices for Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and Substance Use Disorders (SUD)**

Training would provide an overview of evidence-based interventions across prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and recovery support. Possible areas include:

- Use of medications for OUD (MOUD) and integration with counseling and wraparound services.
- Harm reduction strategies, such as naloxone distribution and fentanyl test strips.
- Building recovery-ready communities through peer services, housing, and employment supports.

## **Discharge Planning (APIC Model) & Reentry Programs**

This session would address strategies for supporting individuals returning to the community from jail or prison, grounded in the APIC model (Assess, Plan, Identify, Coordinate). Topics may include:

- Comprehensive screening and needs assessment before release.
- Coordinated transition plans linking individuals to housing, health care, treatment, and benefits.
- Examples of partnerships between corrections, behavioral health, housing, workforce, and community providers to reduce recidivism.
