# PSCC 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter Indicator Report Summary


December 1, 2025

- ADP continues to trend higher each month since early 2025, consistently staying above 3,000 since June 2025.
  - In 2024, following significant increases driven largely by Uniform Bond Schedule changes, we observed a decline in ADP from July 2024 through January 2025 due to the efforts of PCSO and the Courts focusing on expediting cases (**Page 1-2**).
- The population remains heavily weighted with felonies, with pretrial felonies making up nearly 60% of the jail population (**Page 3**).
- Pretrial felonies remain elevated, growing from 1,712 in February 2025 to 1,844 in October 2025, and pretrial misdemeanors have incrementally increased in the same period from 299 in Spring 2025 to 389 in October 2025. It is important to note that sentenced felons and sentenced misdemeanor numbers have also incrementally increased during the same period demonstrating efforts on continued case movement. This trend explains much of the ADP growth. Meanwhile, federal activity has increased—evident in higher ICE/USM billing and a sharp rise in “Other Agency” arrests driven by federal holds (ICE/USM) and transported individuals from outside jurisdictions. These combined factors are likely contributing to ADP levels (**Page 3-4**).
- Federal holds and delays in treatment bed availability continue to impact higher occupancy (**Page 5**).
- On-View ordinance arrests are up slightly in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter at 101. Up from 84 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter and 70 in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter (**Page 6**).
- VOP arrests remain significantly low, which could impact future jail inflow and supervision trends (**Page 6**).
- JAC bookings remain steady with a slight decrease in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2025 (**Page 8**).





### ADP By Quarter View






**By Status - October 2023 - 2025**





**Pretrial & County Sentenced Over Time View**


