PSCC Follow-Up: St. Petersburg Data on Youth Arrests

Responses to Questions Raised at the Previous Meeting

During the March 9, 2026, PSCC meeting, members requested additional details on St. Petersburg PD's juvenile arrest numbers to better understand what is driving the figures reported in the Indicators Report.

What We Found:

- The JAC booking figures and agency arrest figures reflect different populations. JAC bookings capture all youth brought to the facility, including non-arrest contacts such as runaways and disorderly conduct situations. Agency arrest figures capture only formal criminal arrests. This difference in what each source measures accounts for the variation in the numbers.
- St. Petersburg PD provided year-over-year arrest data (below) showing that formal juvenile arrests have declined significantly — from 1,299 in 2016 to 642 in 2025.

Next Step:

- Chief Melissa Reid (DJJ Circuit 6) is working to determine whether a breakdown of JAC bookings by contact type can be provided. That information will give the council a more complete picture of the youth population entering the JAC going forward.

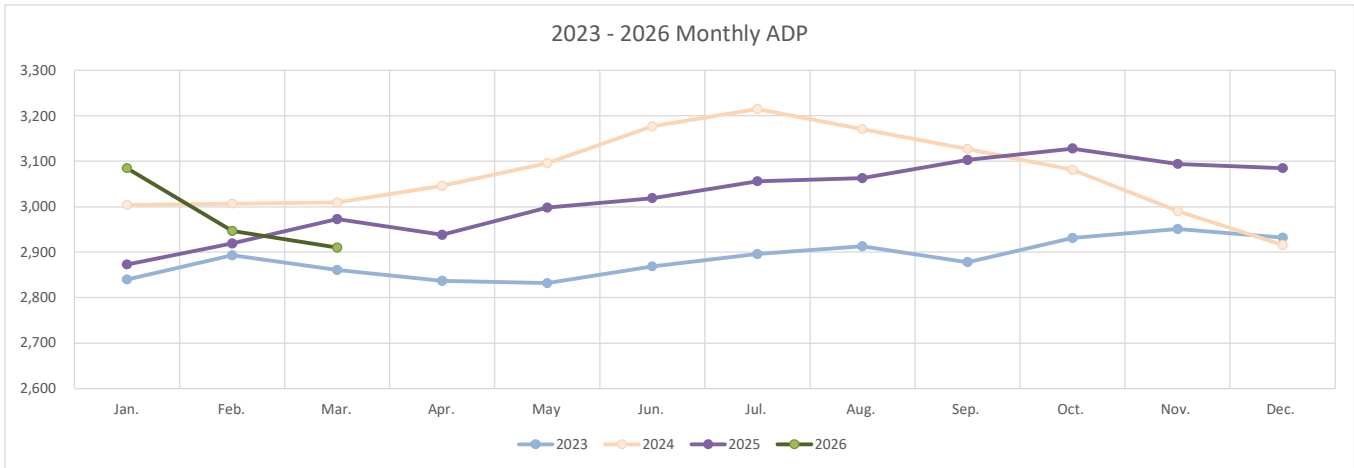

(Indicators Report – Quarter 2 Overview)

- **ADP decreased from 3,085 in January 2026 to 2,910 in March 2026**, dropping below 3,000 for the first time since early 2025. Pretrial misdemeanor bookings declined from 382 in January to 333 in March, and pretrial felony bookings decreased from 1,836 in January to 1,733 in March, contributing to the overall reduction. **(Page 1-3)**
- **ICE and Border Patrol holds continued to increase significantly**, reaching 513 in March 2026, compared to 269 in March 2025 and 76 in March 2024. This represents a seven-fold increase over two years and continues to exert notable pressure on the overall jail population. **(Page 4)**
- **Treatment Placements and DOC transfers showed meaningful improvement through Q1 2026**. Individuals awaiting a treatment placement bed decreased steadily throughout Q1 2026 (71 in January to 60 in March), while both individuals released to treatment facilities and those shipped to DOC increased consistently over the same period. This reflects a notable shift from Q1 2025, when all three categories were trending in the opposite direction — suggesting the treatment and transfer pipeline is moving more effectively this quarter. **(Page 4).**
- **JAC bookings totaled 611 in Q1 2026, compared to 660 in Q1 2025** — a decrease of approximately 7% for the same period year over year. **(Page 7)**

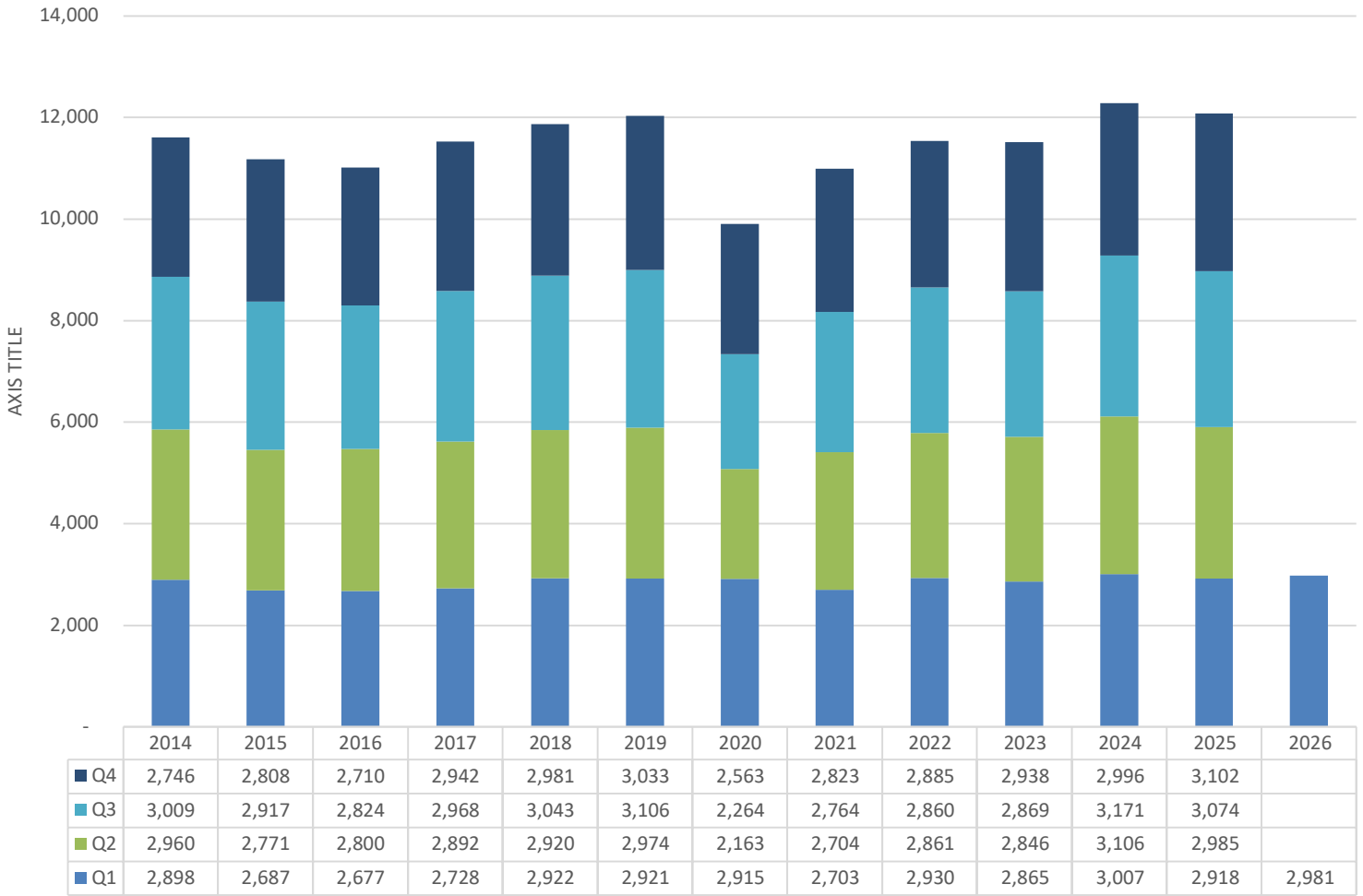

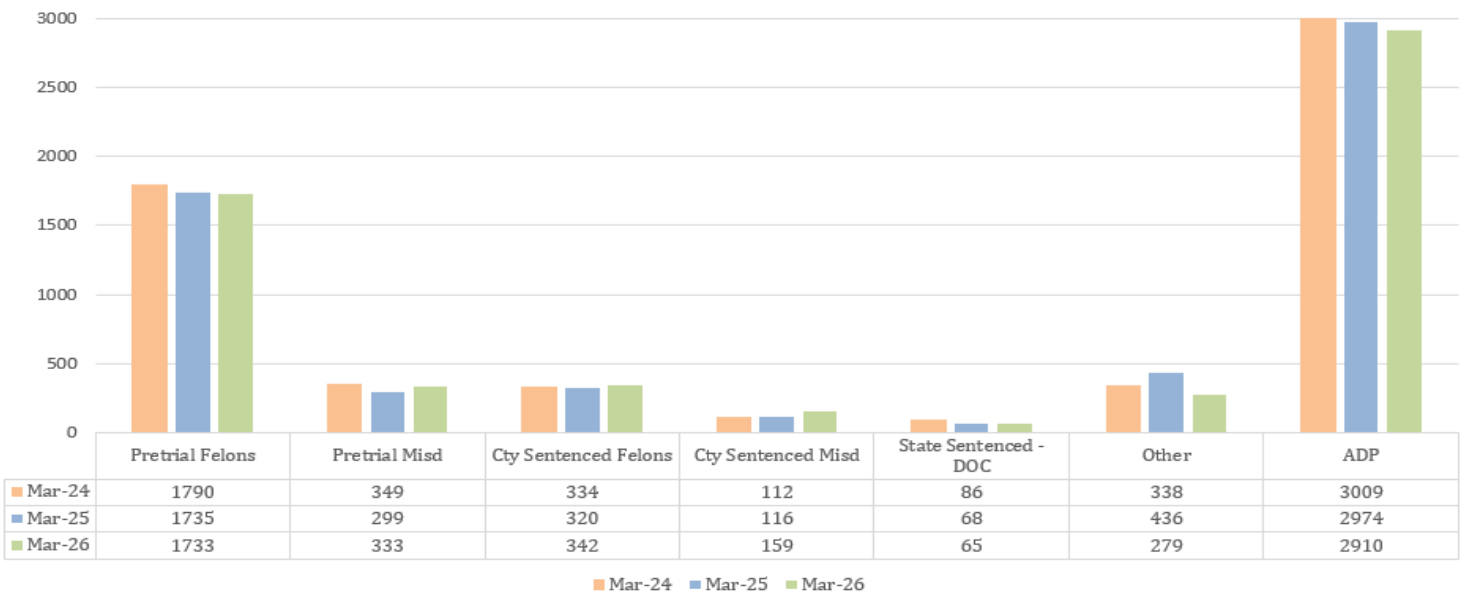
PINELLAS COUNTY JAIL AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP)

Pinellas County Jail ADP By Quarter (2014-2026)

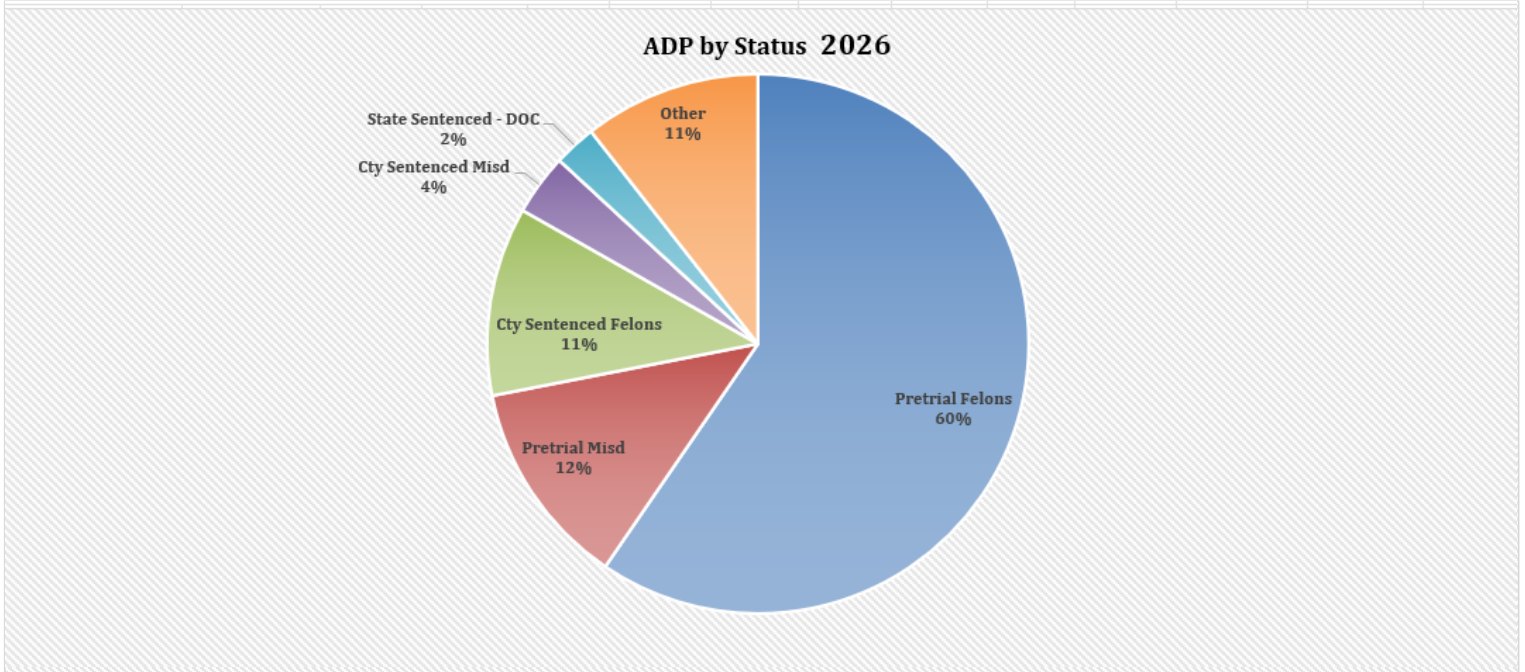


By Status - March 2023 - 2026

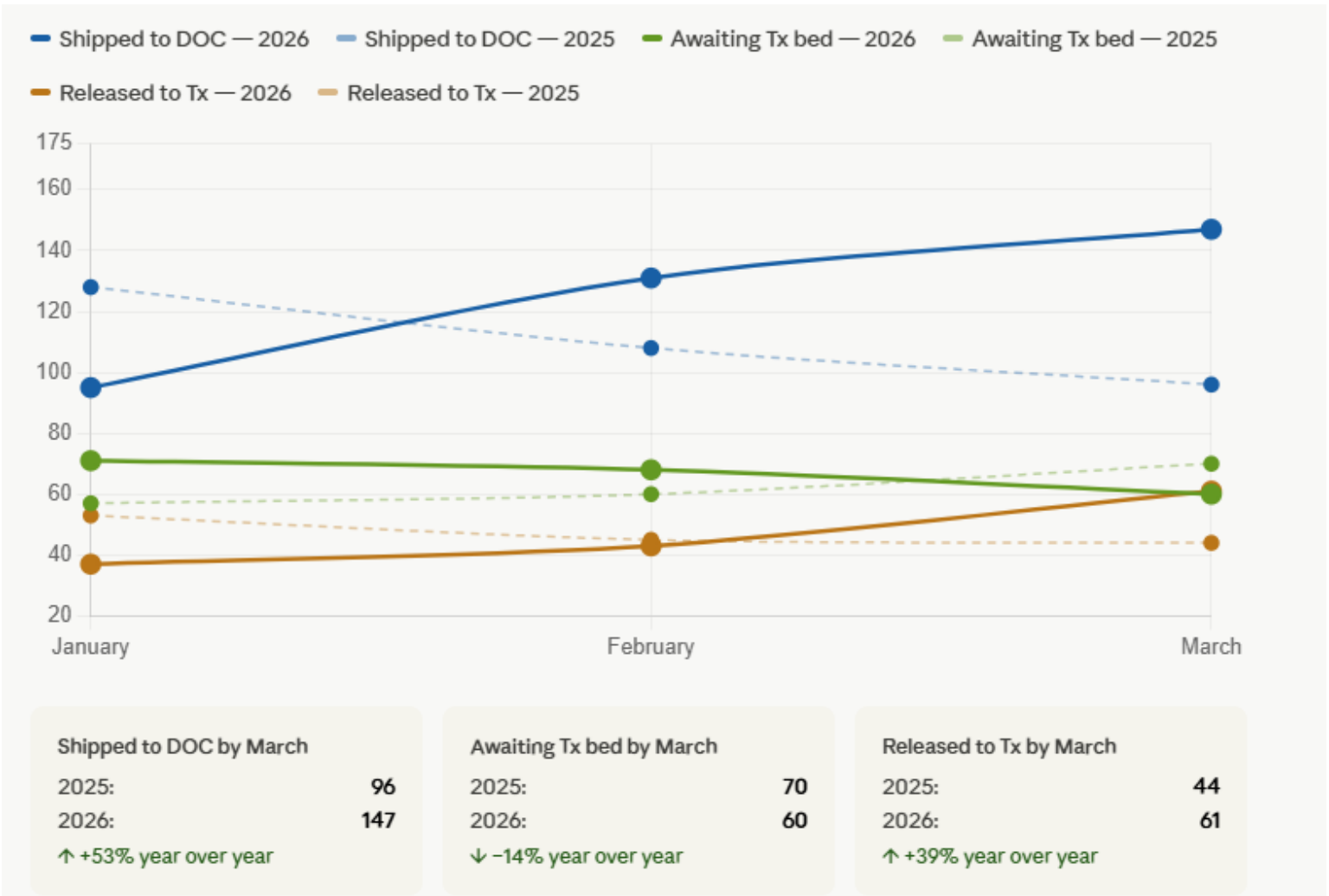

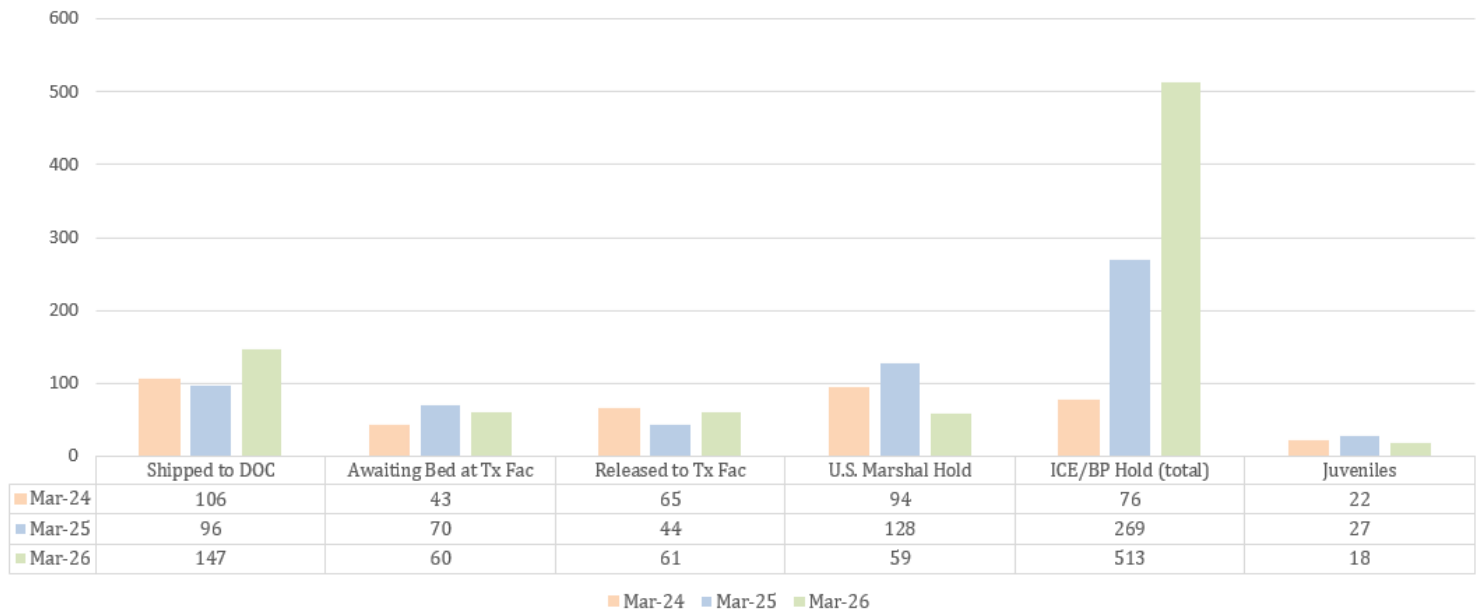

Special Classes of Inmates - March 2023 - 2026



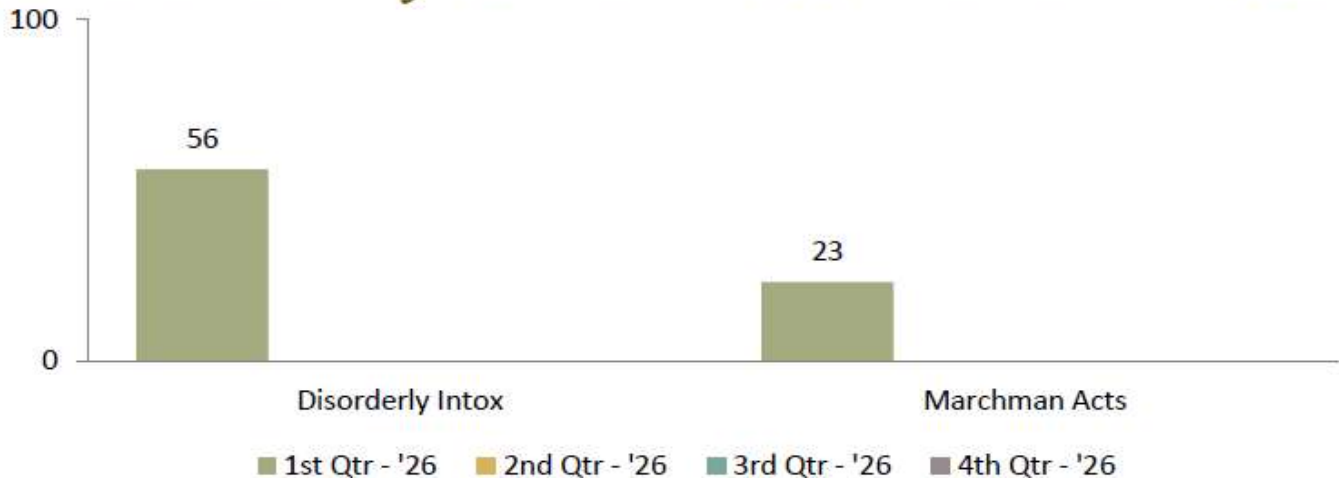
